<u>Eligibility</u>: All students who are expected to graduate WCHS by June 2021 and will be enrolled in an accredited college program within one (1) year of the scholarship deadline are eligible. Scholarship winners will be required to provide the WCHS with proof of registration from their college Bursar's office.

The Core Value of Respect

Respect is the most important value at the Williamsburg Charter High School. Please review the attached application materials and ask yourself if you have honored the following, or if over time you learned to honor them. As your stay at the WCHS comes to an end and you begin a new journey, these core values of respect are the things that we hope you will take with you, more so than Science and Math or English and History. You will need to discuss these values as part of your scholarship application.

Self-Respect by their manner and in their school uniform dress, students are to carry themselves with a sense of dignity at all times.

Respect for Peers by showing support and encouragement; by refraining from insulting, deriding, bullying, or humiliating others; and by refraining from physically, emotionally, or sexually harassing other students.

Respect for Differences by demonstrating sensitivity to physical, cultural, religious, gender, and sexual orientation differences, and by refraining from the use of stereotypes.

Respect for Property by respecting the personal property of other students, taking care of school property including making a conscious effort to maintain a neat, clean and organized environment.

Honesty by being truthful in all dealings with other members of the community, whether the matter is academic, social, extracurricular or other situations requiring one to act with integrity. It is expected that students accept responsibility for their actions and never claim ownership for something that does not rightfully belong to them such as a personal material possession or intellectual property. When taking a test in school or completing an at-home exercise, it is expected that students act honorably and never misrepresent another's work as their own. Such actions are a discredit to the student and the community as a whole.

Cooperation by working together towards common goals. This means not only interacting fruitfully with their peers, but with all members of the community. It is expected that students seek out new relationships and opportunities for mutual learning and growth.

Effort by devoting their fullest energy, thought, and attention to the task at hand, students are expected to put forth their personal best and encourage their peers to maximize their potential in the classroom and beyond.

Self-Control by using proper restraint over emotions and impulses, and by making rational decisions with just motivations, even under stress.

Respect for Adults by listening and following directions, by using appropriate tone of voice, by honoring a teacher's need to present a lesson to the entire class, by demonstrating awareness of the appropriate time and place to disagree with a teacher's decision, and by accepting feedback.

Punctuality by arriving on time, prepared, and ready to work in the morning, for each class, and for all after school activities.

Good Manners by being polite and friendly to others. Through their speech, demeanor, attitude, and body language, students are expected to be welcoming and gracious to all community members.

Fairness by treating all their peers as equals, whether they are old friends or new acquaintances. Students are expected to approach issues objectively and act in the best interest of the community.

Citizenship by being an active participant and meaningful contributor to the community. Behavior models consideration of the physical environment and more importantly, of community members.

SCHOLARSHIPS OVERVIEW

It was our hope that upon reaching the point of our first senior class and inaugural graduation, the school would be able to establish its own scholarship program. Since then, our scholarship program has awarded grants to 6 graduating classes. This program focuses on individual scholarship and achievement, leadership and citizenship, and strength of character over the past four years at the Williamsburg Charter High School. In all aspects of our scholarship program, we are looking for individuals who have internalized the mission, vision, and core principles of the school; this feat is more important than any academic achievement.

We are proud to announce this year's scholarships and hope that in years to come, under the good stewardship of the school's Board of Directors and leadership, we will be able to expand the opportunities available to our students.

The following scholarships do not require the divulgence of financial information as they are not needs based but rather determined by merit. If any of the scholarships listed below require you to supply additional information, you will receive a separate set of instructions when you have identified your desire to apply for that specific scholarship.

All scholarship awards are to be paid to the college that you will be attending if the award amount is more than \$500. Scholarship awards are to be used toward reduction in tuition or towards books and materials during the freshman year at college. As these scholarships are for one year only, parents and students should plan accordingly for future financial obligations.

Scholarships will be awarded in amounts ranging from \$250 - \$500based on availability of funds in any given year.

The Legacy Scholarship -Applicants must have embodied all the characteristics described in our school's Core Value of Respect. Applicants must have a solid academic record and must respond to the Legacy Scholarship questions in the supplementary scholarship guidelines. (see p. 7)

The "Wolverine" Award for creativity, leadership and extraordinary contribution to the school community- Each year a graduating Senior will be rewarded for sharing their energy, creativity, and positive attitude with all members of the Williamsburg Charter High School community. The WCHS Spirit Scholarship shall be awarded to an innovative school leader whose persistence and willingness to take risks has led to ideas, events and activities which promoted an exciting and joyous school environment. In addition to being highly self-motivated the recipient of this scholarship has demonstrated the ability to motivate and involve those around him/her in the realization of their vision of the school as a community. Ellen Eagen Kimatian School Service Scholarship - Applicants must have attended the Williamsburg Charter High School for at least 2 years. Applicants must have embodied all the characteristics as described in our Core Value of Respect statement and a have solid academic record. Applicants must respond to the WCHS School Service Scholarship question in the supplementary scholarship guidelines. (see p .7)

Challenge Scholarship- Recognizes a student or students who have overcome significant challenges or obstacles in pursuit of education. These obstacles may be learning challenges, circumstances outside of school, or any other barrier the student has faced and surmounted on the way to becoming a graduate of the WCHS. (see p. 8)

Please note that <u>most</u> of the scholarships require a separate essay. Please spend time thinking about and crafting your response. Your essay is a significant part of your application, and it is easy to tell a well thought-out essay from one that was written the night before.

All essays and responses must be TYPED and submitted on 8 ½ by 11 paper in 12 pt. Times New Roman font only. Must include your student ID number and the name of the scholarship you are applying for should be on each page in the upper right hand corner.

All submissions must be original work. Any student submitting plagiarized work or suspected of submitting plagiarized work will be automatically disqualified from all WCHS scholarship opportunities.

THE WCHS LEGACY SCHOLARSHIP

Must have 1 recommendation from either a teacher or staff.

Applicants must type a 250 word (one page typed) response to the following bullet points:

- Refer to the two qualities you chose from the list above and explain how those two qualities enabled you to generate the type of school environment described in the award description.
- Cite specific examples when you best demonstrated these qualities during your time at WCHS.
- Explain why you think the type of environment that you have helped create is important in a school.

WCHS CHALLENGE SCHOLARSHIP

- 1. The student must type a 1-page essay that explains how they have shown resilience in overcoming obstacles.
- 2. They must plan to attend college or a program that will prepare them for employment.
- 3. They must have 2 recommendations from teachers that attest to their positive citizenship within the WCHS community.

ENGLISH SCHOLARSHIP CRITERIA

To be considered for the WCHS English Scholarship:

- 1. Student must have earned an 85% or higher for all English classes (or 75 in AP).
- 2. Student must have earned an 80% or higher on an English regents exam.
- 3. Student must secure an English teacher's recommendation for this scholarship.
- 4. Student must type a well-developed response of at least four paragraphs to ONE of the following topics:
 - a) Discuss how your experiences in English class have inspired or influenced you as a student.
 - b) Discuss ways in which effective communication skills (reading, writing, speaking, and listening) are necessary for success in life after high school.
 - c) Discuss a work of literature you studied as an English student that has had a profound effect on your life.
- 5. Student must also submit a writing sample of his/her choice. This can be creative or a graded assignment in which you scored a high grade.

MATHEMATICS SCHOLARSHIP CRITERIA

To be considered for the WCHS Mathematics Scholarship:

- 1. Student must have an average of 85% or higher in all mathematics classes (75% or higher for students that have completed at least one full-year AP mathematics course).
- 2. Student must have passed at least two mathematics regents exams with at least a 65% on one; and at least an 85% on the second.
- 3. Student must get a Math teacher to complete a scholarship recommendation form for this scholarship
- 4. Student must write a 1 page essay reflecting on their math experience at WCHS and how their experiences in math class have inspired or influenced them as a student.

HISTORY SCHOLARSHIP CRITERIA

To be considered for the WCHS History Scholarship:

- 1. Student must also submit a writing sample of his/her choice. This can be creative or a graded assignment in which you scored a high grade.
- 2. Students must have earned an 85% or higher on both the Global and United States History Regents Exams.
- 3. Student must secure a History teacher's recommendation for this scholarship.
- 4. In addition, students must type an essay that responds to the following quote using their knowledge of Global and United States History to show an understanding and appreciation of the study of history.

SCIENCE SCHOLARSHIP CRITERIA

To be considered for the WCHS Science Scholarship:

- 1. Student must have earned an 85% or higher in all Science classes (or 75% in AP).
- 2. Students must have earned an 80% or higher on one Science regents exam and passed another Science regents exam.
- 3. Student must secure a Science teacher's recommendation for this scholarship.
- Student must type a 1-page essay reflecting on their Science experience at WCHS and how their experiences in class have inspired or influenced them as a student

ART SCHOLARSHIP CRITERIA

Student received 85% or higher in all Art classes

• Two letters of Recommendation

The letters may come from any combination of:

- Advisor
- Academy Leader
- Counselor
- Student Life Associate
- Core Academic Teacher

Letters from Art Teachers will not be accepted

ESSAY:

- Part 1: Your Artist Biography please feel free to write *your personal* art story. Begin with your earliest artistic memory and work your way forward, highlighting the important milestones and achievements along the way. Conclude with your high school experience, and how you intend to follow an Art related career path in the future.
- Part 2: Use the questions provided to help frame your essay on Visual Arts in Education:
- What purpose does Visual Arts serve in education today?
- For whom is Visual Art created?
- In what settings is Visual Arts available?
- How is it funded?
- Explain why you believe schools have decided to reduce funding to Visual Arts programs or even completely remove it from their institutions?

Portfolio Review

Students must submit 5 original works of art created within this year 2018-2019, for review

PERFORMING ARTS SCHOLARSHIP CRITERIA

The Williamsburg Charter High School Performing Arts program was created with the specific intent of giving those students interested an outlet for artistic expression and freedom. Each student that participates in our Performing Arts program contributes to the culture of the program and ensures its survival in our school. Theatre, Dance and Music are tools that bring people together both on and off stage. The lessons, techniques and stories have been passed down through generations of artists who have devoted their lives and hearts to storytelling and communication. Our deepest hope is that those who leave us continue that tradition in some way be it as an actor, dancer, musician, teacher or as a patron of the arts.

Those who wish to apply for the Performing Arts Scholarship must meet the following requirements:

- 1. Applicants must have been part of at least one WCHS Theatre, Music, or Dance production or have completed at least one year of performing arts courses.
- 2. Students must secure a Performing Arts teacher's recommendation for this scholarship.
- 3. Applicants must write a 500-word essay answering **ONE** of the following

OPTION #1) Can the performing arts be used as a tool to bring about social change? If yes, how? If no, why not? Create a coherent argument supported with examples.

OR

OPTION #2) Performing isn't always about the final destination, but the entire journey to that culminating event. Describe a failure or failures that you have had during your tenure in the WCHS performing arts department, what you did when faced with those failures, and how that has affected the way you approach your work both in and out of theatre. Has that failure shaped the way you plan to handle adversity in the future? Explain why, or why not.

Or

OPTION #3) Should every child be exposed to the performing arts in the education system and be a required component of study? Why? or Why not?

Methuselah Scholarship

The requirements for this year's Methuselah Scholarship are:

- -must be a graduating senior
- -must hold an 80% GPA or above
- -must submit proof of college acceptance
- -750- 1000 word essay on the prompt:
