

# THE NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY COALITION

A COMMUNITY CENTERED RESPONSE TO ENDING GUN AND COMMUNITY VIOLENCE.

Our Presenter: Mr. Juan Ramos Executive Director Southside United HDFC and Founder The Wick Against Violence Program.

## NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY COALITION EARLY HISTORY AND WORK.

• The Wick Against Violence was created in 2017 as a program/initiative of the Neighborhood Safety Coalition under the umbrella of Southside united HDFC – Los Sures a long-time community housing and social services agency. The local community, specifically Bushwick and Borinquen houses at the time were experiencing an uptick in gun violence and killings. Together with the Bushwick Houses RA and other community stakeholders our organization and the RA decided to join forces and develop a response to the violence. Through this effort the The Neighborhood Safety Coalition (NSC) was created. The NSC works closely with local organizations, neighborhood churches and pastors, community residents and other stakeholders to engage individuals most likely to commit a shooting or be Victims of shootings. The program works primarily in the NYCHA developments of Bushwick houses and Borinquen Houses.

## NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY COALITION EARLY HISTORY AND WORK.

• "The Wick Against Violence" program is a community-based effort to reduce shootings and killings and challenge violence in all its forms. Staff work toward challenging gun violence from occurring in the program target areas by mediating conflicts that may end in gun violence and acting as peer counselors/mentors to men and women who are at risk of perpetrating or being victimized by violence. The Wick staff works closely with neighborhood leaders, residents, community-based partners, and businesses to promote visible and public messaging against gun violence, organizing and activating residents to act by denouncing shootings and all forms of violence, reactivating underutilized spaces due to violence, and responding to shootings at the development and at the local hospital.

## HOW THE PROGRAM RESPONDS TO GUN VIOLENCE.

#### 1- Detect and interrupt potentially violent conflicts

- Trained violence interrupters and outreach workers prevent shootings by identifying and mediating potentially lethal conflicts in the community and following up to ensure that the conflict does not reignite.
- Prevent Retaliations Whenever a shooting happens, trained workers immediately work in the community and at the hospital to cool down emotions and prevent retaliations – working with the victims, friends and family of the victim, and anyone else who is connected with the event.
- Mediate Ongoing Conflicts Workers identify ongoing conflicts by talking to key people in the community about ongoing disputes, recent arrests, recent prison releases, and other situations and use mediation techniques to resolve them peacefully.
- Keep Conflicts 'Cool' Workers follow up with conflicts for as long as needed, sometimes for months, to ensure that the conflict does not become violent.

## HOW THE PROGRAM RESPONDS TO GUN VIOLENCE.

#### 2. Identify and work with highest

#### Potential(Risk)Little resourced individuals.

- •Trained, culturally-appropriate outreach workers work with the highest risk to make them less likely to commit violence by meeting them where they are at, talking to them about the costs of using violence, and helping them to obtain the social services they need – such as job training and drug treatment.
- •Access Highest potential (Risk) Little resourced—Workers utilize their trust with high-risk individuals to establish contact, develop relationships, begin to work with the people most likely to be involved in violence.
- Change Behaviors Workers engage with high-risk individuals to convince them to reject the use of violence by discussing the cost and consequences of violence and teaching alternative responses to situations.
- Provide a case management plan Workers develop a caseload of clients who they work with intensively – seeing clients several times a week and assisting with their needs such as drug treatment, employment, leaving gangs.

## COMMIT TO WORKING WITH THOSE MOST AT RISK TO COMMIT GUN AND COMMUNITY BASED VIOLENCE OR BE VICTIMS OF GUN VIOLENCE.







## HOW THE PROGRAM RESPONDS TO GUN VIOLENCE.

#### 3. Mobilize the community to change norms

- •Workers engage leaders in the community as well as community residents, local business owners, faith leaders, service providers, and the high risk, conveying the message that the residents, groups, and the community do not support the use of violence.
- •Respond to Every Shooting Whenever a shooting occurs, workers organize a response where dozens of community members voice their objection to the shooting

- Organize Community Workers coordinate with existing and establish new block clubs, tenant councils, and neighborhood associations to assist
- Spread Positive Norms Program
  distributes materials and hosts events to
  convey the message that violence is not
  acceptable.

#### ENHANCED PROGRAM RESPONSE (HOSPITAL)

#### 4. Hospital Response and Follow Up

•The Neighborhood Safety Coalition partners with local hospital trauma centers to provide a comprehensive response whenever a gunshot, stabbing, or blunt trauma victim arrives at the hospital. Program staff intervene during the critical window after a violent incident to prevent retaliation and interrupt the cycle of violence.



## UNDERSTANDING THAT IN ORDER TO REDUCE GUN VIOLENCE WE MUST BE READY TO CHALLENGE VIOLENCE IN ALL ITS FORMS.

- •The Neighborhood Safety Coalition's core mission is to reduce gun violence and killings. We also understand that violence come in many forms, and we have used our approach to respond to all forms of violence including:
- Domestic violence
- Gender-based violence
- Hate Crimes
- Gang violence
- School Violence
- Generational Violence

- IN ORDER TO MOBILIZE WE MUST UNDERSTAND THAT WE CANNOT:
- ISSUE DRIVEN
- JUSTIFY VIOLENCE
- BLAME VICTIMS

\*We also must understand that those who commit violence may be victims (hurt people hurt people)

## ENHANCED SERVICES HELP TO STRENGTHEN THE CHANGE PROCESS AND CAN PROVIDE TRANSFORMATIONAL HELP AT THE MOST CRITICAL TIME.

#### **Wrap Around Supportive Services**

- •School Conflict Mediation: The school-based conflict mediation component is designed to provide culturally competent programming to at-risk youth to reduce the likelihood of their involvement in violence in their school and community while increasing their attendance, academic progress, and other social measures. The program includes school-wide activities to assist in changing culture around violence and to assist schools in their response to incidents that occur in the school or community.
- •Employment Program: Justice Plus is a flexible, wraparound designed to support referred participants of neighborhood-based Cure Violence programs by providing a range of work readiness opportunities. These opportunities include: work experience placements, hard/vocational and soft job skills development, and job search and career awareness/planning competencies. The program participants receive stipends.

- Therapeutic Mental Health Services: Therapeutic mental health services are offered and designed to provide culturally competent therapeutic support to children, youth, and families impacted by gun violence by improving resilience, network support, and building skills in self-management and self-care.
- Legal Services: Cure Violence participants receive support from the Legal Aid Society such as how to identify a legal emergency and substantive legal issues such as criminal law, housing, family, employment issues, what to do post-conviction and the hidden civil consequences of a criminal conviction. Legal representation is provided as needed.
- Anti- Gun Violence Employment Program: The Anti-Gun Violence Employment Program (AGVEP) is a seasonal employment program that employs participants (14-24) who are serviced through the New York City Crisis Management System. The program consists of two phases: a 6 week summer program and a 25 week school year program. Job responsibilities include but are not limited to community canvassing, asset mapping, data/research gathering, community outreach and coordinating/ conducting shooting responses.

## A COORDINATED COMMUNITY RESPONSE TO VIOLENCE IS TOOL WE CAN USE TO CHALLENGE BEHAVIORS AND BEGIN RECLAIMING OUR UNDER-UTILIZED SHARED SPACES.



# **MARCY LAB**

The MARCY LAB is a non-profit post-secondary school based in Brooklyn, NY.
